March 10th OSO Meeting!

Starting at 1:00, much interest was shown by 43 members and guests purchasing orchids brought by today's speaker, Dr. Diana Plahn, and her husband Craig.

Calling for order at 2:00, President Brenda Jones asked program chair Tom Larkin to present our speaker. Dr. Plahn, from St. Louis, gave an informative talk about judging orchids, including merit and show judging. New and superior forms of orchid species are judged on point scales; excellent growing is important. Some of the requirements to become a judge are growing at least 100 plants for 5 years, willingness to do the paperwork needed, high ethical standards, and a realization that AOS is reflected at all times. The plant to be judged should be in bloom, no insects, groomed to look its best, no dead growth, inflorescent growth trained, and blooms well-spaced . . . In judging for ribbons, each orchid is compared to others in its class. She completed her presentation

with slides showing beautiful specimens, pointing out good and bad features.

The Secretary's minutes for February were printed and accompanied the March newsletter. It has been decided to continue this method of disseminating the minutes in order to save on time at the meetings.

OSO Personalities Meet Tina and Oid Hankins

Tina was raised by her grandmother whose passion was gardening. So Tina grew up loving plants; at age 5, she got her first cactus plant and then, at age eleven, her first orchid, a Ludisia but at the time she did not know it was an orchid. Later, in high school she learned about orchids and realized that she had one a joyous surprise. She began collecting seriously in about 1996 when she found out about OSO by phoning the Co-operative Extension Center. The person answering the phone that day was Pauline Keegan who invited her to a meeting. What a happy coincidence!

Over several years, she accumulated a fairly large collection; she found Catts easy to grow so they became her favorites: she also likes various species and oncidiums. As so many of our members in recent times, she lost almost her entire collection during a power outage that lasted several days. The entire family had to move to a motel and Tina insisted upon taking as many plants as possible with them; she ended up with four bags and managed to save a few of her favorite plants. Now they are trying to start a new collection. Her growing environments include window-sills, a picnic table under shade trees and an unheated greenhouse. Tina and Oid are also active in

Farmers of America since high school (her son Leighton is a third generation FFA member). She helps to train students and organize horticultural contests, which begin at the U of A. She also contributes daffodils and orchids to the botany classes at



the HS for dissection. They both enjoy introducing young students to plant life and spark their interest with "awesome" plants like the Venus fly-trap and the sensitive plant.

In addition to the school projects, Tina contributes ivy to decorate the annual events sponsored by the Breast Cancer and Heart Associations. She is a member of the Rose Rustlers, a group dedicated to saving old varieties of roses otherwise doomed on construction sites. She is also active in the Rose Society and in Washington County Master Gardeners. Tina encouraged Oid's interest in

plants and conservation - not a difficult task since he has always loved the outdoors and has discovered so many beautiful and seldom visited places in Arkansas. They were married in 1996 on Mt. Magazine and their certificate was signed by then Lt. Gov. Huckaby and AR. Sen. Bill Walters. Their combined family includes six children ranging in age from 11 to 20, and one grandchild. Unlike many busy parents, they are very actively involved in their children's education with regular school visits. They take the children to the ONSC for various projects each year and camp out in the caves nearby. They are also planning an educational project closer to home: five acres on their property will be devoted to distinct gardens (some of which are already planted):

A dinosaur garden (topiary designed); an herb garden; a prayer garden, which has mostly white flowers and some of the plants named in the Bible; a cactus garden with other desert plants like yucca and tumble-weed; a wildflower garden, which already has some pink lady-slippers; and a prairie garden. The gardens will encourage visitors, especially young ones to love and respect the gifts of nature.

I would like to say hello to all our new members and give an update about the achievements of the Society's Conservation Project with the Fort Smith Water Project.

In October we discovered a rather large colony of Ladies' Tresses (Spiranthes cernua) that were endangered due to the Fort Smith Water Project which will join Lake Fort Smith and Shepards Springs Lake into one. In the previous months our efforts, as well as the city of Fort Smith, have been to relocate and preserve these beautiful flowers.

The Conservation Committee members and other volunteers have made several trips to the area where the orchids were

found to remove the plants. They were kept in storage at the Fort Smith Environmental Facility where Randy Easley, the environmental manager, was extremely helpful and showed great interest in the project. Through the efforts of society members and biologists Don Clover and Tim Smith, we were able to remove 322 orchids for replanting.

On March 9th Channel 5 Arklahoma Outdoors did a story on the conservation effort. Society members and guest along with producer Fred McClure returned to the original dig site to tape footage for the story. At that time the members dug another 154 plants that came up since the last dig, bringing the total to 476 plants that have been removed for relocation.

I would like to thank all those who helped in this very important mission toward conservation. We were glad to have members of the Botanical Garden, Native Plant Society, and the Heritage Commission as part of this effort

The Saturday that the Channel 5 program will be aired, other information and updates will also be posted on the Society's website. Anyone who would like to help with this continuing project can call or e-mail any Conservation Committee member.
