## A Belated Wichita Show Report

The weekend of April 27, the Kansas Orchid Society hosted the spring meetings of both the American Orchid Society (AOS) and the Southwest Regional Orchid Growers Association (SWROGA) in Wichita, Kansas.

OSO was well represented with an exhibit by Suzanne Hobbs and Sarah Waddoups, and an additional educational exhibit by Sarah. Suzanne and Sarah received three AOS awards. Doug and Beth Martin (whose home society is the Orchid Society of Greater Kansas City, but who are also OSO members) had another exhibit showing their remarkable temperate terrestrial orchids and received two AOS awards for *Cypripediums*.

There was an abundance of great speakers. Dr. Leonid Averyanov was the keynote speaker. Dr. Averyanov has studied the orchids of Vietnam extensively. His presentation on the their ecology was fascinating, and the pictures of rare species, many found and described by Dr. Averyanov, had everyone craning to see. Other speakers included Dr. Raymond A. Cloyd, Robert Fuchs, Patricia Harding, Norito Hasegawa, Bryon Rinke, and our speaker this month, Alan Koch of Gold Country Orchids.

Most of you are probably aware that Oak Hill Gardens, of Dundee, Illinois, was recently sold. That means the Wichita show was our last time to buy orchids from Greg Butler, the face of Oak Hill at shows for years now. Oak Hill has been a major source of orchids for us, and we've enjoyed visiting their greenhouses during several Chicagoland orchid festivals. We'll miss Greg's smiling face, somewhat snarky humor, and discussion of topics from orchid gossip to college football. We wish Greg, Liese, Hermann, and Dorothy the best in whatever they choose to do, even if that's

nothing. We also wish Oak Hill continued success with the Franz family and look forward to seeing new faces at shows soon.

### Speaker Bio - Alan Koch

Alan Koch owns and operates Gold Country Orchids where he specializes in miniature and compact Cattleya's. Alan started growing orchids in 1969 with 3 Cymbidiums given to him by an aunt. While in college, he became interested in other orchids and discovered many would grow outdoors in Southern California. He has moved five times as his orchid obsession has led to the need for more growing space. With the last move, he purchased 10 acres of land in Lincoln, California for his 300,000 orchids.



He is recognized as an expert in the Brazilian Cattleya alliance and a trend setter in miniature Cattleya breeding. Alan has been published in the Orchid Digest, and the American Orchid Society magazines. He has also been published in the proceedings of the World Orchid Conference. He is an internationally known speaker. He is a past member of the AOS Judging Committee, and the Research Committee, as well as an Accredited Judge and is Vice-chair and Training Coordinator for the California Sierra Nevada Judging Center. Alan also served two terms on the Orchid Digest Executive Committee and Board of Directors, and is one of the current directors, as well as a Trustee for the AOS.

### Don't Get Burned ... Sarah Waddoups

Sometimes we learn as much from seeing mistakes as we do from seeing perfectly grown plants. So, here is an example of what NOT to do. Both of these phals got too much light and quite literally have a sun burn. Each year I take all the plants out and scrub the glass, the brick walls and the floor of my greenhouse/sunroom. This year, I accidentally left a flat of phals too far out on the porch and they got scorched. There is no way to "fix" these leaves, but the plant is still alive and eventually its new leaves will hide these ugly ones.

The same thing can happen if you grow in a windowsill. Sunlight's direction and intensity will change throughout the year. Plants under lights can also get burned. Prevention is the best cure; sadly aloe and ocean potion don't work on orchid leaves.




